Issues to Consider

Before Students Leave

- Fill any prescriptions and confirm they are legal in host country
- Consider any mental health needs
- Have a complete physical before and update medications and/or dietary restrictions
- Understand and have emergency response plan in place
- Understand how to deal with Cultural Shock
- What, if any, are COVID-19 implications in host country

Before Students Leave

Know insurance policy intimately and make certain it covers:

- First dollar coverage
- Has no deductible/no co-pays
- Has contracted provider network
- Medical Evacuation and Repatriation on excess of \$50,000
- Political Evacuation and Natural Disaster coverage
- Trip interruption/cancellation
- Telehealth/teletherapy

Before Students Leave

- Alcohol and risky behavior
- Know on-site Director's contact information
- Keep phone charged
- Understand local laws and don't break them
- Mentally prepare for the unexpected
 - Missed connections
 - Last minute changes
 - Weather

Quarantine is temporary, but curiosity about the world is endless.

Virtual Study Abroad

- Virtual tour of a company and interaction with employees.
- Virtual "hang-outs" with the online community.
- Enhance language skills through conversation practice.
- Explore a concept from the point of students from other countries and cultures.
- Icebreaker activity: Group presentation by students from each country to inform counterparts about their part of the world.
- Icebreaker activity: Individual student presentations to acquaint one another on a more personal level.
- Interactive cultural quizzes and scavenger hunts.
- Online discussions, group work, break-out rooms with classmates.
- City tours developed by onsite staff.
- Virtual buddy program


