

Exploring Crisis "Management"







Actions needed vary dramatically based on circumstances

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Best way to prepare is to think through scenarios in advance

Crisis scenarios help us identify the resources and collaborators we need Actions Needed for Managing Crises



Goal is to return to your campus with an action plan to research and reach out to collaborators



Consider the What? Where? When? How? Who? Of the crisis

Using a Rubric to Create a Crisis Toolkit

Think about your role and responsibilities vs that of others

Who do you need to know:

- on campus
- in the community
- in the government/legal realm

What actions can you take now to:

- Help prevent the crisis in the first place
- Reduce the damage during the crisis

CRISIS # 1: Law/Criminal Case

4 international students are living off campus together. On a Friday night, one student (underage) gets drunk and starts shouting at their roommates. Police were called due to the disturbance and given a warning. The same student does not calm down and ends up attacking one of their roommates. Police are called again, and this time, end up arresting the student. DSO finds out the following morning that this student was sent to jail. What are the next steps?





CRISIS # 2: Mental Health Case

A student becomes manic after discontinuing medication for Bipolar Disorder. She stops attending class. Residence Life is notified after several manic incidents in the dorm. A decision is made by several campus offices that the student needs to return home to continue treatment and take a leave of absence from school. The student has an episode at the airport, refuses to board the plane and is put on a 72-hour psych hold at a facility.





CRISIS # 3: Health/Medical Emergency

Four international students travel to Las Vegas over Thanksgiving Break. They are driving at night in a rented vehicle. The driver swerves off of the road to avoid a coyote. Two students are banged up but are generally okay. One student is not wearing their seatbelt and is thrown from the car and dies. The student in the passenger seat is severely hurt and is in the ICU. She is in a hospital outside of Las Vegas when one of the students calls and tells you what has happened.


