# Why is it Important to Teach your International Students about Sexual Assault?







# Majority of Sexual Assaults are Not Reported

- Self-blame or guilt
- Shame, embarrassment or wanting to keep assault private
- Believed it was not important enough to report
- Did not want to get the perpetrator in trouble
- Fear of not being believed or retaliation
- Believe that the police would not or could not help





#### Consent

#### Sexual Assault and Consent

What is Consent?

#### Consent means that a sexual activity is agreed upon by **all parties every step of the way.**

- Verbal: "Yes", "I'm open to trying", or other verbal agreement
- Physical queues

# **Consent for International Students**

In the US, consent is NOT:

- Marriage/being in a relationship
- A person's clothing
- Flirting/Kissing/Touching
- Being incapacitated
- Previous consent
- Being alone with another person
- Being under the legal age of consent

# Group Activity - Consent

Minah and Phillip are at a house party drinking quite heavily. Minah becomes drunk. She's slurring her words, unable to hold a conversation, and stumbling around the house. Minah's roommates want to stay at the party so Phillip offers to walk her home. On the walk, she's stumbling and bumping into things along the way. Once Minah is home, Phillip invites himself in and tells Minah he's going to help get her to bed safely. Minah starts undressing in the bedroom and doesn't tell Phillip to leave. Phillip starts kissing Minah and they have sex.

#### Staying Safe/Bystander Intervention

# Bystander Intervention - C.A.K.E.

How can students prevent sexual assault and becoming active bystanders:

- Create a distraction do what you can to interrupt a situation if you see something occurring
- Ask directly talk to the person in trouble and see if they need help
- Refer to an authority talk to a person in charge such as a bartender, security guard or police.
- Enlist the help of others ask others to help you intervene

#### Michigan State University – SARV Prevention Program

- SARV = Sexual Assault & Relationship Violence Prevention Program
- Required in-person workshop for all first-year and transfer students
- Facilitated by undergraduate Peer Educators
- Goals of SARV Prevention Program:
  - Create awareness
  - Educate MSU students about the programs and resources available
  - Empower MSU students to become active in the prevention of SARV
  - Educate all students to understand they share a responsibility in the prenetion of sexual violence and the creation of a safe community



### SARV Workshops

- Workshops are required, and take place in campus neighborhoods where students live
- LBGTQ Workshop
- International Student Workshop
   "Learning about sexual assault and relationship violence is never easy, and it can
   be even harder when your native culture and language is very different from that
   of America. The International Student SARV Workshop has been designed to
   accommodate a wide range of cultural backgrounds, social norms and education
   regarding these issues. The workshop will give more definitions of terms, education
   regarding American university culture, and additional information about legal
   issues and resources for international students."

### SARV International Student Workshop

- Geared toward a wide variety of international students
- Key topics covered:
  - MSU's SARV policy & definition
  - What reporting options students have: the crisis line and what confidentiality means
  - What mandatory reporting means
  - Busting myths surrounding reporting sexual assault
  - Educating on the resources available on campus

# **Reaching International Students**

#### •Challenges:

Reaching students through email reminders
2,000 incoming international students each year
Language and cultural barriers
Working across multiple departments on campus

 No data on participation in workshops and effectiveness of online training



## **On-Campus Resources**

- •The SARV Prevention Program strongly recommends that all MSU students, and visitors to MSU, be directed to MSU resources FIRST
- Resources available through MSU are likely to be more inclusive and Title IX specific
   All victims can seek resources at MSU, regardless of where the assault took place

### Short-term International Students



•American Semester Program at MSU – semester, year, or 3-week programs

•Semester/year-long students enrolled at MSU

 Triggers them to take the Online Training – required, places hold on account until complete

•3-week summer programs are not enrolled

 $\circ\mbox{There}$  is a gap here, which we hope to fill with the Online Training

•Even though these groups are on campus for a short time, they are still a vulnerable population for sexual assault

### After A Sexual Assault

# Talking with Survivors

Be aware of your tone (e.g., calm), language (e.g., gender-neutral), and physical presence (e.g., non-threatening)

Explain to them that your first priority is to keep them safe and supported

• Let them know that you are here to help them and will need to ask some questions for clarification

Use validating, reflecting, paraphrasing, empowering statements

- "It's normal to feel [repeat back the word(s) the survivor used]."
- "I can see how that would seem very [scary, frightening]"
- "It sounds like you're saying..."
- "I believe you."

Acknowledge the discomfort - this is a terrible situation

# Seeking Help

Safety

- Encourage victims to go to a safe place safety is the #1 priority
- Consider long term options, including housing accommodations

Disclosure

- Encourage victims to reach out to someone friend, advisor, family member
- Reminder that RAINN hotline offers free, confidential, anonymous, 24/7 help

Medical and Mental Health

- Encourage victims to reach out to campus resources
- Visit centers.rainn.org to find local resources

- A trained member of a local sexual assault service provider will direct the victim to appropriate health facilities to help them.
