Definitions

<u>Sexual Violence</u>: A sexual act committed against someone without that person's freely given consent.

Forms of Sexual Violence:


- Rape or sexual assault
- Stalking
- Dating/Domestic Violence
- Child sexual assault or incest
- Unwanted sexual contact/touching
- Sexual harassment
- Sexual exploitation
- Showing one's genitals or naked body to other(s) without consent



Introduction to Sexual Assault












Majority of Sexual Assaults are Not Reported


Sexual Assault and Consent

Consent means that a sexual activity is agreed upon by both parties every step of the way

- Verbal: "Yes", "I'm open to trying", or other verbal agreement
- Kentucky:
- Physical cues

Age of Consent:

- Kentucky: 16 (raised to 18 if in a position of trust or authority)
- Ohio: 16 (minors under 13 and older with a partner under the age of 18
- Indiana: 16 (minors 14 and older with a partner under the age of 18. Raised to 18 if an a position of trust or authority



Consent for International Students

In the US, consent is NOT:

- Marriage/being in a relationship
- A person's clothing
- Flirting/kissing/touching
- Being incapacitated
- Previous consent
- Being alone with a man
- Being under the legal age of consent

Alex then says that having sex is more fun than watching TV, and Toby chuckles, and turns off the tv. They both start to remove their clothing. They have sex.







Safety on campus

Tips to help students stay safe on campus:

Ensure students are aware of on-campus resources

- Resident Advisors
- Professional Staff
- On-Call Staff
- Departments of Public Safety

Encourage your students to be active bystanders

• Ask to partner with offices on campus to bring trainings to your students

Practicing Bystander Intervention

Jeff, a young fraternity pledge, has been designated as the sober driver for the evening. Upon receiving a call, he pulls to the front of the bar and picks up an older fraternity brother and a female Chinese students he had never met. His fraternity brother instructs him to take them both back to his place. The Chinese student protests that he had promised to get her back to her own house. His older brother insists that Jeff ignore the pleas of the woman.

What could Jeff to do in this situation?

Tomoko a student leader enthusiastically encourages new international and U.S. students to join the International Center programs. She friends Bruno on facebook and gives him her number so he can text her if he has questions. By the middle of the semester Bruno is texting her 10 times a day and showing up outside of her classes to walk her home. Dana notices how uncomfortable Tomoko is becoming around Bruno.

What could Dana do in this situation?

Dealing with an Occurrence

Dealing with an Occurrence

Inform victims of their rights and options. Students victims of sexual assault may:

- Choose to report it to the police
- Choose to file a report with the school
- Seek medical assistance
- Find counseling and support services

They may choose any, all, or none of these options. After experiencing a powerless situation, we want to give them as many choices as possible.

Seeking Help

Go to a safe place - the Student's safety is #1 priority

Talk to someone

The student may consider reaching out to someone. They may choose to talk to you, a friend, family member. You can also suggest the student reach out to RAINN hotline which is completely anonymous.

Go to a nearby medical facility

In centers.rainn.org, you can find local clinics where the student may get medical attention.

Campus Health Clinics

All schools should have some sort of health services option. This may be a clinic, a health center, a partnership with a hospital, or a staff person who can direct someone to those resources.

During business hours, direct students to the health center. More information may be provided by the Dean of Students Office about hours and options.

After hours, consider calling the University Police to determine emergency response.

Many hospitals offer Sexual Assault Forensic Exams (SAFE) for survivors of sexual violence. These exams should be free for anyone who has experienced sexual violence. The hospital should also call the local rape crisis center and may call the police. Students have the right not to talk to police or file a report.

Title IX and International Students

- Protects all students regardless of national origin, immigration or citizenship status
- Ensures that all reporting forms, information or training on sexual violence is
- provided in a manner accessible to English learners
- Helps to ensure that a student stays in status
- Is accessible even if students are not in country when incident occurs
